CRITTER OF THE WEEK!

MOLE COWRY (cypraea talpa Linnaeus)—This cowry's handsome shell is jet black around the base and on the underside; it's back is brown and banded in gold; it's mantle is black and densely covered with blue-green spots. It is found in sheltered waters in depths of at least 20', the largest individuals usually found in Hawaii! . Growing to about 3 1/2 inches, this little guy was cruising across the sand today with his mantle fully extended! Cowries are one of the few shells that have a mantle extending over it's entire shell, keeping the surface smooth, shiney and beautiful. Most cowries are nocturnal. There are 200 species of cowries, 35 of which are known to be in the Hawaiian Islands!
